Depending on the family, the fifth generation were either the young adults who fought in the American Revolution, or else children who were born around that time. Several of the men fought in the Revolution, typically serving for a one-year enlistment, which was common at the time.

After American independence, most moved west, mainly to eastern Kentucky near Lexington and Cynthiana, although some went to eastern Tennessee and Missouri. It would appear that the Revolution took a toll on the family, since some are shown as being insolvent or tax-delinquent in Virginia, having "removed" to Kentucky. As when they left England, they left Virginia seeking a more promising future.

More About Wharton Schooler:

Between 1776 – 1783: Served in the Continental Army during the American Revolution³². Wharton gave Patriotic Service during the Revolutionary War. He gave beef to the cause, and apparently the government recognized this non-militia service with land grants and pensions. (Elizabeth Schooler Watkins)

July 18, 1782: Wharton Schooler received 100 pounds for administering the will of Leanna Wharton. (Some records have listed her as Leanna Schooler, but apparently that is in error.)

1787: Wharton and Margaret signed a Deed in St. George Parish, Spotsylvania County, Virginia.

1787: Wharton was listed as an Insolvent, Spotsylvania County, Virginia. It stated that he owed 1.16 pounds and had removed to Kentucky. Then about 10-12 years later it was mentioned that he now lived in Fayette County, Kentucky and was able to pay his debt.

October 2, 1787: Wharton Schooler and his wife Margaret of Spotsylvania County, Virginia, sold a tract to Robert Sales of same county. Another source indicates that on the same date, Wharton Schooler and his wife Margaret of Spotsylvania County, Virginia, sold 365¼ acres of land in Berkeley Parish, Spotsylvania County to Thomas Ball of Amelia County (DB L 1785-1788).

1795: In Fayette County, Kentucky, Wharton Schooler purchased 100 acres of land on Boon's Creek.

October 29, 1799: Sold interest in land in Spotsylvania County, Kentucky. Richard Collins and Sarah, his wife, of Kentucky, by Henry Collins, their attorney in fact; Moses Quisenberry and Mary, his wife, of Orange County, Virginia.; Wharton Schooler and Margaret, his wife, of Kentucky; John Edwards, by Wharton Schooler, his attorney in fact, and Henry Gatewood and Ann, his wife, of Spotsylvania County, Virginia (heirs of Henry Gatewood, Senior, deceased), sold to Martin Brent of Spotsylvania County, Virginia the land whereon said Henry Gatewood Senior, deceased, lately lived in Spotsylvania County, etc. (Book P pg 511.)

1800: Appears in census, Fayette County, Kentucky - "Second Census of Kentucky 1800" by G. Glenn Clift, 1982

1820: Appears in census, Fayette County, Kentucky³¹

Wharton's will, dated June 07, 1819 and probated May 1824 in Fayette County, Kentucky, mentions his wife, Margaret, son, Lewis, and son-in-law, Robert D. Schooler, daughters, Patsy Allen, Polly Schooler, Sarah Adams, Beulah Estes, Betsy Schooler, and Peggy Schooler. (Will Book Page KY341, Book No. F³³)

His will, dated August 08, 1822 and probated in 1822, Bourbon County, Kentucky, mentioned his wife and children by name: beloved wife Patty, son John Schooler, son Benjamin Schooler, daughter Elizabeth Crow, daughter Nancy Schooler, daughter Sally Schooler, son Henry Schooler, and son Samuel Schooler. More About Martha Foster:

Between 1822 – 1833: Martha Schooler, widow, paid taxes on 103-105 acres on Green Creek, in Bourbon County, Kentucky.

September 30, 1828: Moved to Pike County, Missouri.

Two of Benjamin Schooler and Martha Foster's children's birth years are listed in FamilySearch Ancestry File as being before their marriage date; probably a mistake, given the times, but it is of course possible.

More About William Schooler:

American Revolutionary War Service

From 1779 to 1780: Served as sergeant in the American Revolution, 6th Virginia Regiment, from Bowling Green, Caroline County, Virginia, Captain Minor's Company, Colonel John Taylor's Regiment. John Taylor formed his own regiment of volunteers, and was sent to join Lafayette in the fight against British rule. ("Grand Old Caroline, Virginia's Third Most Populous & Affluent County in 1776", by Susan F. Beason - http://www.co.caroline.va.us/grand.htm)

Received Bounty Warrant No. 6499 for land (Columbus, OH, Survey Book, Vol. ? D, p. 83). After 1760, the Virginia Council offered stong inducements to get people to settle in the new county of Augusta. Many families flocked to these new lands. Among them were Harrisons, Schoolers, Vances, Crawfords, Springers and other friends and relatives. After settling in what was thought to be Augusta County, Virginia, it transpired that they were in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. As population increased, counties were divided and

divided again so that some people found themselves in four different counties without ever leaving the farm. About 1785, many of these related families moved from Pennsylvania to Kentucky. They located in Cynthiania in Harrison County. They went down the Ohio River to Limestone (Maysville) and along the Licking River to Cynthiania and Paris. Among them were the Schoolers. They were probably drawn to Kentucky by the land grants given for war service.

1822: Granted a pension from Fayette County, Kentucky. Pension applied for October 03, 1828 in Fayette County, Kentucky, Claim #46344, in the amount of \$120 per annum. (Letter from Marion L. Pollack.) 30

(These dates seem backward, and one or both may be in error.)

March 13, 1795: Witness to will of Robert McKettrick, will proved July, 1795. Witness - William Schooler. (Will Book A, p. 2; Kentucky Court Other Records, Vol. I, compiled by Mrs. Wm. Breckenridge Ardery, 1972, p. 55.)

July 10, 1795: William Schooler is mentioned as a "teste" in court documents in Harrison County, Kentucky in the will of Robert McKittrick, Sr.

1798: William Schooler and wife Elizabeth vs. Lawrence Harrison [possibly her first cousin, 1753 – 1833?] - charge of slander for claiming that Elizabeth committed adultery Michael McLaughlin. Lawrence had made the claim in public on October 01, 1796 apparently in hopes of breaking up William and Elizabeth. The court appointed two arbitration groups, but neither could apparently reach a decision as to whether Lawrence should pay the plantiffs for damages in the amount of a few hundred pounds of money. The outcome of the defamation suit is not clear, but William and Elizabeth requested subpoena of many of their neighbors. (Bundle #9, Suit #263)

November 28, 1799: "John Harrison [this was Major John Harrison, Elizabeth's brother] and wife, Mary Ann (Johnston) Harrison, of the county of Jefferson, Kentucky, on the first part, and William Schooler and Betty, his wife (which Betty is sister of said John) and Elizabeth Schooler, a daughter of said William and Betty Schooler, of the County of Harrison, Kentucky, on the other part, grant land on waters of Mill Creek, 104 acres, being a part of an entry made in name of Benjamin Johnston." (Cynthiana Court Records, Book 1, p. 799. D.A.R. No. 282,657 is traced from this line. From 'Genealogies of Virginia Families', from 'The Virginia Magazine of History & Biography', Vol. III, Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1981, pp. 948 - 957.) Elizabeth Schooler Watkins has the following text: "John Harrison and wife Mary Ann of Jefferson County, Kentucky to William Schooler and wife Betsy (Formerly Harrison and sister of the said John) and Elizabeth Schooler, infant daughter of Willam and Betsy of Harrison County right to 140 1/2 acres on Mill Creek, a branch of south fork of Licking, and then to Elizabeth Schooler. Said Mary Ann being a representative of Benjamin Johnson Sr." (Harrison County, Kentucky Deeds)






